along with a customized plaque, which will arrive at a later date.

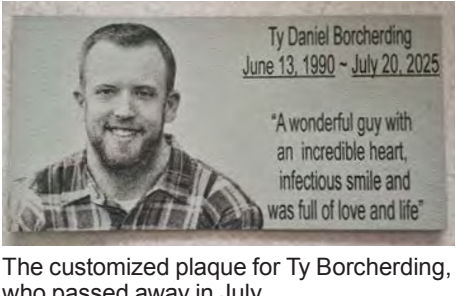
Kandi wanted to thank the community for their overwhelming support after the passing of her son.

Together, they easily put in thousands of hours of work this last year.

The Hampton Tree Board, which was started in 2012 by Dick Lukensmeyer, has received the Tree City USA Growth Award for the last twelve years, making a difference in the Hampton area and beyond.

Volunteers eye shutdown impact

A shutdown of the federal government has area volunteers looking at potential impacts.

With opposition to a Continuing Resolution continuing, SNAP benefits are running out.

That has food bank personnel concerned.

“Yes!! we are definitely in more need of money and food donations and are expecting more families to need our help,” said Suzy Teskewith the Pine Lake Food Shelf. “In October we served our all-time high of 150 families (over 450 adults and children).”

Teske pointed to the organization recently becoming a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, allowing people to deduct their donations.

“[D]efinitely we are expecting new families [but we’re] not sure how many,” said Teske.

The Northeast Iowa Food Bank serves part of the region.

“We have already seen an increase in need, even prior to, today, November 3rd, but also the end of October,” said Barbara Prather, executive director. “We expect to see this into the future.”

Prather said the organization is asking the community for donations and sourcing additional product.

Staffers and volunteers at food pantries across Franklin County are also stocking up and asking for donations.

La Luz Centro Cultural Director Janette Flores Acolt told Mid-America Publishing that they’ve received an influx of calls and messages from people who are searching for donated food.

“We encourage people to give monetary donations because we get food from the Food Bank of Iowa, where we get food at a discounted rate,” she said. “But we, of course, appreciate any type of donation, whether that’s money or canned goods.”

Hours for La Luz’s food pantry will be announced on their Facebook page in the near future, said Acolt.

State support was announced Thursday by the office of Gov. Kim Reynolds.

The Iowa National Guard has been ordered to help with food distribution, and the Iowa Department of Health and

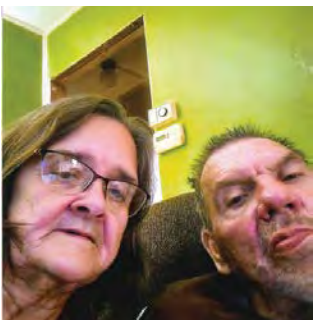

Director Mary Amsbaugh and NIACC Student Enrollment Advisor Valerie Gonzalez and many others. The event was held for H-D-CAL students from ninth to twelfth grade, along with high schoolers from West Fork and Belmond Klemme.

From skilled trades to military branch representatives, every career cluster was represented at the fair, said Krull, giving the students a chance to learn about different opportuni-

ties before graduating from high school.

The Franklin REC, Iowa State Patrol and Community Christian Daycare were among the 50 groups in attendance on Wednesday morning.

Krull said the students were given bingo cards to help them be brave and encourage them to go up to the different tables.

"They take their cards up to the tables because they want to get them stamped, but the places

will make them interact," she said. "So they have to ask a question or be willing to ask a question. And if they get a bingo, all of the places brought prizes, and then we draw about 20 prizes per grade level."

Krull said coordinating the fair takes a lot of work. "This takes a lot of work and it takes a team," said Krull. "We meet in early spring and we look at all the calendars and say, we

know want to do something towards the end of October, which is when the quarter is changing so you're not disrupting a lot of classrooms and big projects going on. Then we look at what's going on in the communities and things like that. Then we set the date and send out save the date cards to places that have come in the past and spread the word."

Kyle Larson is the 2025 NASCAR Cup Series Champion

Kyle Larson finished third in the Championship Race behind race winner Ryan Blaney and Brad Keselowski to claim his second title in NASCAR's top division. It was the 15th Cup championship for team owner Rick Hendrick. "Honestly, I can't believe it," Larson said. "Like, we didn't lead a lap today. Somehow won the championship. I mean, really, I'm just speechless. I can't believe it. We had an average car at best." After the race, team owner Rick Hendrick admitted how bleak things looked, even after Kyle Larson replaced William Byron as Hendrick Motorsports' strongest championship threat to Joe Gibbs Racing's Denny Hamlin in overtime. "I almost jumped off the box," Hendrick said. "I mean, I was ready to call Joe and say congratulations to Denny. All of a sudden, here we are, we're going to win this thing." That call of congratulations ended up being unnecessary. Larson summoned just enough from his battle-tested No. 5 Chevrolet in a two-lap dash to the end, denying Byron and Joe Gibbs Racing contenders Denny Hamlin and Chase Briscoe in a winner-take-all final. "Never did I feel like I had it," Larson said, sharing some of the same uncertainty as his team owner held. The triumph that sealed Larson's second Cup Series championship was a microcosm of the No. 5 team's tribulation-filled season, one marked by loss, by change and by resilience. Each time, the group coalesced and forged ahead. Sunday, the No. 5 team found that same style of fortitude, flipping the script on a pair of powerful performances by Hamlin and Byron, who combined to lead 260 of the 319 laps. All the while, Larson remained within striking distance, running among the top five through the first two stages.

Last Weekend's Race: Ryan Blaney won the Championship Race

Ryan Blaney won the Championship Race on Sunday. He led 20 laps in securing his fourth win of the season and the 17th of his career. The win was his first at Phoenix after three straight runner-up finishes in the championship race. In 2023, however, second place was good enough to earn Blaney his only series title to date. "It's just cool to end it on a good note," Blaney said. "It's just cool, and obviously, we had a fast car all day. Those other guys were just kind of faster getting going, and I could never retain the lead."

Chevrolet completes 2025 NASCAR Cup Series Championship sweep

For the 29th time, Chevrolet has swept the NASCAR Cup Series championship titles, capturing its 34th Driver Championship and 44th Manufacturer Championship in the division following the season finale race at Phoenix Raceway. Adding onto its already series-leading legacy, this season marks the fifth consecutive season that Chevrolet has won the manufacturer championship title at NASCAR's highest level to keep the Bowtie brand undefeated in the Next Gen era. In each of the past five seasons, Chevrolet has garnered a double-digit win count to lead the series, with the 2025 season seeing six different Chevrolet drivers reach victory lane: Shane van Gisbergen (five wins; second-best of the series); Kyle Larson and William Byron (three wins); Chase Elliott (two wins); and Ross Chastain and Austin Dillon (one win each). "Sweeping the championship titles at NASCAR's highest level is a remarkable accomplishment," said Mark Reuss, President of General Motors. "Winning the NASCAR Cup Series Manufacturer Championship for the fifth consecutive season is a testament to the relentless effort of Chevrolet engineers and team partners who bring their best to the track every week."

Delivering death tax relief for Iowa farmers and small businesses

Family farms, small businesses, and local manufacturers are the backbone of Iowa's economy. Agriculture, business, and manufacturing create good jobs in our communities, keep our main streets strong, and help young families plant their roots in Iowa. To ensure that we have a strong Iowa, we need to support these vital sectors that make invaluable contributions to our economy and our communities.

One of the greatest threats to the long-term success and vitality of family farms and small busi-

nesses is the death tax. This unfair double tax forces family-owned-and-operated enterprises to pay a massive tax bill to the federal government when a loved one passes away. During a time of grief, Uncle Sam should not be sending families, farmers, and small business owners a tax bill. It's costly and wrong.

As part of President Trump's Working Families Tax Cuts, I included my bill to increase the death tax exemption to \$15 million so that farmers and entrepreneurs don't need to sell their farm or business that they worked for generations to build just to pay a huge tax bill from the federal government. Most of the time, farmers and business owners' assets — like farmland, equipment, and physical infrastructure — cannot be easily liquidated, which makes the death tax even more egregious. We want our farmland and our businesses on Main Street to be passed down to the next generation so that we can protect our proud traditions in Iowa. We certainly

don't want our farmland to fall into the hands of China or other foreign adversaries, and we don't want businesses that have been in the family for generations to close their doors because of the punitive death tax. Fortunately, with my legislation included in President Trump's package of tax cuts for working families, farmers and small business owners have some more breathing room in their budgets, ensuring that the next generation can afford to carry on historic legacies.

President Trump's Working Families Tax Cuts also included many positive provisions for agriculture, business, and manufacturing. For agriculture, we strengthened crop insurance, invested in foreign animal disease prevention and response, and increased reference prices for corn from \$3.70 to \$4.10 and for soybeans from \$8.40 to \$10.00. For small businesses, we made the 20% deduction on qualified business income permanent and helped them

offer paid family and medical leave to their employees at a more affordable price, which was legislation that I led. For manufacturing, we made investing in their operations more attractive by restoring 100% bonus depreciation and immediate R&D expensing. To onshore more manufacturing in Iowa, we also created a new category of immediate expensing to encourage the construction of U.S.-based manufacturing plants and agricultural facilities. These provisions will truly be jet fuel for our economy, create jobs, and deliver bigger paychecks for families and workers.

Born and raised in rural Iowa, I want our communities to thrive. That means supporting agriculture, small businesses, and manufacturing and passing policies that encourage economic growth and development. From delivering additional relief from the death tax to investing in our small businesses on Main Street, we will build a stronger and more prosperous Iowa.

It was a pause... a chance to slow down and just be together. I feel nostalgic for that feeling sometime.

And maybe that's what cozy really feels like, not the blankets, low lights and candles (those help), but the feeling of being present in your own life with those who you love. We didn't have any work phone calls to navigate, kids to get to their next event, or any other demands life placed on us, during that blizzard.

So as cozy season rolls in again,

the shorter days, the early sunsets, the soups, the holidays, I've been thinking about how to recreate that snowed-in peace without needing an actual blizzard. Because cleaning up after a frosty mother nature isn't always fun.

So this is what I'll be doing...

Construction Projects Galore



The All Iowa Roofing team working on the Franklin County Courthouse roof on Thursday, Oct. 30. Roof work began on Monday, Oct. 27, and it's expected to be completed within two weeks, pending the weather.

But we are finally here, and we are very excited.

If you follow along in the Supervisors' minutes, you've probably also read something about an electrical upgrade project and a tuckpointing project. Unfortunately, when it rains, it pours, right?! And that means, many projects to maintain our beautiful Courthouse have collided all at once.

The electrical upgrade is a project to pull new (and bigger) service into the Courthouse to be able to sustain the higher demand on the electrical service that we face now with technology than when it was last updated (our best guess was the 1970's when they

renovated the courthouse). We don't know what the cost of this is yet, but we do know how important it is for our day-to-day operations and being safe (avoiding brownouts, etc.).

Next is the tuckpointing project. A reminder that our beautiful courthouse is over 130 years old and made of brick and stone. It has been needing to have some tuckpointing done for several years and things just have gotten in the way, so now we are at a place where it REALLY needs to be done. We have a choice to either fix the bad spots or tuckpoint the whole building. It is a difficult decision for the Supervisors as they have to way the

pros and cons along with the financial implications for the County.

Finally, thanks to the April storm, we also sustained damage to three of our five statues atop the courthouse. If you aren't aware, the statues are copper and that makes it incredibly difficult to find a contractor who can and will work on them. Thankfully, we have found Midwest Art Conservation Center out of the twin cities who have been down and seen the statues up close, evaluated them, and developed a plan to repair them. This work will be done this coming spring.

This is a long list of maintenance and repairs that need to be (and are going to be) addressed. The Supervisors review plans thoroughly, ask lots of questions, and form a plan after that. They continue to work towards what is necessary to maintain our buildings and be fiscally wise about them. If you have questions about the projects, you are welcome to contact me in my office, watch the Supervisors' meetings on YouTube, or even attend a meeting in person. There will be many more updates to come on this, but for now, I wanted to share what we have going on! Until next time...

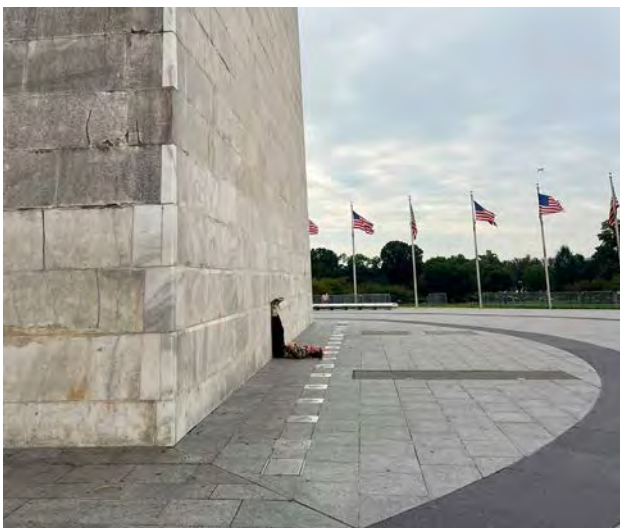
If you’ve known me for any long period of time, you’ll know that I can’t sit still. What if it doesn’t feel the same as it did two years ago? Long story short, this is going to be a lovely opportunity for me to step outside of my comfort zone once more.

In addition to my return to Malaysia, there are two other programs that have been weighing heavily upon my mind: one, a highly competitive course-embedded travel class offered by Grinnell next semester, and two, another Department of State-sponsored exchange (like my program in high school), this time over the summer



and with an express focus on language. For the former, I’ve already run the gamut of application processes, and accordingly have now received word of my selection. What that means for me is that this BIO-195 course will be the sole focus of my spring break, where we’ll spend two weeks in South Africa’s Kruger National Park learning, hands-on, about New and Emerging Infectious Diseases (the title of the course). It also means that immediately following the end of the spring

semester, I’ll be heading to Alaska for a week to study the impacts of climate change.

To be honest, taking this new element of my spring semester into account has been hard to fathom. I like the fact that I can’t necessarily wrap my mind around the opportunities soon to come, and it reminds me of the way I felt leading up to my exchange, unsure of the impacts such an experience would have upon me or my worldviews. 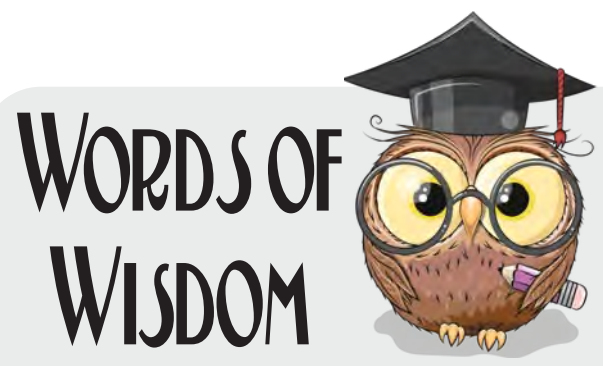

Code Counsel: Brush Up on Fall Cleanup Rules

It is time to dispose of fallen leaves and other yard waste. What does Hampton’s Code of Ordinances say about proper disposal of yard and solid waste as well as recreational burning?

No person shall allow, cause or permit open burning of combustible materials where the products of combustion are emitted into the open air without passing through a chimney or stack, except that open burning is permitted in the following circumstances: 1. Disaster Rubbish, 2. Trees and Tree Trimmings, 3. Landscape Waste, 4. Recreational Fires, 5. Training Fires, 6. Pesticide Containers and seed Corn Bags, 7. Agricultural Structures, 8. Controlled Burning of a Demolished Building.

See Hampton Code of Ordinances Chapter 105 SOLID WASTE CONTROL section 105.05 OPEN BURNING RESTRICTED for details. Any person wishing to conduct open burning of materials not permitted herein may make an application for a variance to the Director of the State Department of Natural Resources.

Recreational fires-- Open fires for cooking, heating, recreation, and ceremonies, provided they comply with the limits for emission of visible air contaminants established by the State Department of Natural Resources. Recre-

ational fires shall be limited to small fires utilizing only natural wood, small sticks, and faux logs. It is unlawful to burn in such fire paper products, plastic, tires, treated, stained, or varnished lumber or any lumber that contains any chemical substances, construction materials except dimensional lumber that has not been treated with chemicals or stained and is cut into lengths not exceeding the diameter of the fire containment device, and/or yard waste such as leaves and grass clippings. Such recreational fire shall be contained in a fire ring or other recreational fire containment device not exceeding three (3) feet in diameter with the flame height not to exceed four (4) feet. Such fire shall be always supervised by a competent individual and extinguished completely before leaving the site of the recreational fire. Such fire shall be extinguished if determined to be a nuisance as defined by Chapter 50 of this Code of Ordinances.

Solid waste--Chapter 105.06, BURNING AND INCINERATION PROHIBITED, states it is unlawful for any person for hire to burn or incinerate or permit the burning or incineration of any solid waste within the city. “Solid waste” means garbage, refuse, rubbish, and other similar discarded solid or semisolid materials, including but not limited to such materials resulting from industrial, commercial, agricultural, and do-

mestic activities.

Yard waste--Chapter 105.08, SEPARATION AND DISPOSAL OF YARD WASTE, states all yard waste shall be separated by the owner or occupant from all other solid waste accumulated on the premises and shall be composted, mulched, or utilized or burned on the premises in such a manner so as not to cause a public nuisance, or placed in acceptable containers and set out for collection. As used in this section, “yard waste” means any debris such as grass clippings, leaves, garden waste, brush, and trees.

Yard waste does not include tree stumps. Burning of yard waste shall be limited to a 30-day period in the fall of each year (the month of November). Said period is determined by the City Manager. Burning during said 30 days shall only be allowed from 12:00 p.m. (noon) until darkness, “darkness” being defined as when the streetlights come on. Burning of yard waste shall not occur at a proximity of less than 20 feet from any structure or building and shall be always supervised by a competent person and shall not be left unattended until the fire is completely extinguished.

No burning in a street or alley--When it is permitted to burn yard waste, know that Chapter 135, STREET USE AND MAINTENANCE, section 135.08 BURNING PROHIBITED, states no person shall burn any trash, leaves,

rubbish, or other combustible material in any curb and gutter or on any paved or surfaced street or alley.

The Hampton Compost and Brush Site is an option for burning. The new compost and brush site is located at 1236 Olive Avenue, which is south of the airport and cement plant. It opened on October 1, 2025, and its hours are Mondays 8 AM–6:30 PM, Wednesdays 2 PM–6:30 PM, Fridays 2 PM–6:30 PM, and Saturdays 8 AM–6:30 PM (hours will be 5 PM on Saturdays after November 1st).

The site is closed in the event of rain and extreme temperatures. The site typically opens the first Saturday in April and closes for the season the first weekend of December. Autumn hours are influenced by daylight savings time.

ALLOWED ITEMS: Leaves & Grass Clippings, Garden Refuse, Tree Limbs/Branches, and Tree Logs (8" maximum diameter). Branches thicker than the size of a pencil should be placed in the brush pile.

PROHIBITED ITEMS: Garbage, Processed Food Items (includes canned/frozen), Plastic (plastic bags for hauling must be removed by customer), Paper or Cardboard, Lumber, Furniture, Tires, Cement, and Metal.

The Aspen Institute Names NIACC as a Top 200 U.S.Community College

The Aspen Institute has named North Iowa Area Community College (NIACC) as one of the 200 institutions eligible to compete for the \$1 million Aspen Prize for Community College Excellence, the nation's premier recognition of high achievement and performance among two-year colleges. The 200 colleges were selected based on their student outcomes data, including retention, completion, transfer, and bachelor's attainment rates. Started in 2010, this is the ninth cycle of the Aspen Prize.

"It's a tremendous honor for NIACC to be named on the top 200 community colleges in the nation, and that NIACC is once again eligible for the \$1 million Aspen Prize, nominated in back-to-back cycles," said NIACC President Joel Pedersen. "This recognition illustrates the consistency of NIACC's high and improving levels of student success. Student success encompasses the following areas: college and program access, teaching and learning, retention, certificate and degree completion, successful transfer, and workforce attainment. It is a true testament to the dedication of our students, faculty, leadership, and the communities that NIACC serves."

Together, these 200 colleges represent the breadth and diversity of the community college sector. They are located in urban, rural, and suburban areas across the country and serve anywhere from a few

hundred students to tens of thousands. Some of these colleges focus primarily on workforce programs, while others focus on transfer and bachelor's attainment or a combination of the two.

"The Aspen Prize rewards colleges that achieve the kind of outcomes that actually matter to students—completing college degree programs that, in turn, lead to lifelong success," said Josh Wyner, executive director of the Aspen Institute College Excellence Program. "Aspen Prize winners offer a powerful message: Community colleges can deliver the kind of life-changing education that makes the American Dream real."

Community colleges educate nearly six million students. Yet community college student outcomes fall short in both the rate at which students graduate and the percentage of students who achieve success after graduation. The Aspen Prize process identifies and celebrates community colleges that demonstrate that achieving stronger outcomes is possible, providing a roadmap of effective practices and strategies for other colleges to follow.

The 200 eligible colleges have been invited to submit an application and participate in a rigorous review process that will culminate in the naming of the Aspen Prize winner in spring 2027. Over the coming 20 months, the colleges that apply for the Aspen Prize will be assessed based on (1) student outcomes data, ranging from student transfer and completion rates to employment and wages after graduation and (2) whether they have engaged in scaled practices

that led to high and improving student outcomes.

"Among these 200 colleges are some really special places that deliver strong and improving outcomes for students across the board," Wyner said. "Our job over the coming 20 months is to gather a lot more data and work with a deep bench of field experts to assess which of these 200 stand out so we can not only honor them with a monetary award, but drive attention to the most effective field practices that other colleges can replicate."

This is the first time since the inception of the Aspen Prize that 200 colleges are eligible to apply, growing from 150. This year, in addition to publicly available federal data, over 600 colleges authorized the use of National Student Clearinghouse data on their institution's degree completion, transfer, and bachelor's attainment rates for full- and part-time students.

The full list can be accessed on the Aspen Prize homepage.

The next steps in the process include:

November 13/December 9, 2025: Application deadlines for the 2027 Prize

April 2026: Announcement of 25 semifinalists, selected based on assessments of extensive data and the application by a group of 11 experts in community colleges, higher education, and workforce

June 2026: Announcement of 10 finalists, selected by the same group of experts

Fall 2026: Collection of additional data from the 10 finalists, including employment and earnings data for

graduates from 2020 and 2025, as well as qualitative assessments of practices by field experts during multi-day site visits to each of the 10 finalists

February 2027: The Aspen Prize winner selected by a distinguished, independent jury finalists at an event in Washington, D.C.

Spring 2027: Announcement of the Aspen Prize winner and celebration of the 10 finalists at an event in Washington, D.C.

Warhawk's Historic Season Comes to End with Playoff Loss

SAINT ANSGAR - West Fork football's incredible season came to an end with a 53-20 loss to the Saint Ansgar Saints in the second round of the class A state playoffs on Friday, October 31. Despite the loss, the Warhawks had the most successful season in program history. The Warhawks finished the season with seven wins, the most in program history, and made it the furthest they ever has in the state playoffs. Warhawk's head coach, Daniel Westhoff, is very proud of the historic season his team had. "Just proud of our kids for their determination and grit and seeing it through," Westhoff said. "Those guys came into the pro-

gram when it was in really rough shape. A lot of these seniors went through a 20-game losing streak before they won their first game. They easily could have quit and openly questioned the direction of the program. Grateful for those guys to continue to put in the work and trust us as coaches." As far as the game goes, the Saints ran away early, outscoring the Warhawks 30-0 in the first quarter. However, the Warhawks would battle the rest of the game, only getting outscored 23-20 in the last three quarters of the game. Junior quarterback Zander Hansen went 6-of-7 passing for 100 yards, two touchdowns and no interceptions. Senior Rylan Dornenkamp was the Warhawks leading receiver in the game with two catches for 54 yards and a touchdown. Senior Dax Suntken was the Warhawks leading rusher with 42 yards on 13 carries and a touchdown. Suntken also caught a pass for a touchdown. The Warhawks end the season with a record of 7-3 and 4-2 in district play, the winningest season in West Fork history. Coach Westhoff spoke on how the success of this season has set the standard for the future of the West Fork football program. "I think it just sets a standard and it shows our kids that this is what it takes," he said. "The younger kids were in the weight room with those seniors and obviously shared the locker room and the huddle with them. They know that this is what it looks like, the work ethic, the buy-in, the commitment, and the positive leadership." Coach Westhoff will look to take the momentum from this season into next season and continue the growth of the West Fork Football program.

Bulldogs Fall to Green Devils in Second Round of State Playoffs

OSAGE - Hampton-Dumont-CAL football lost 27-7 to the Osage Green Devils on Friday, October 31, to bring their season to an end. It was a successful season for the Bulldogs, as they hosted and won their first state playoff game since 2015. Head coach of the Bulldogs, Cole Miller, reflected on the Bulldogs season.

"We showed a lot of growth and tenacity throughout the season," Miller said. "The first game of the year, we didn't play very well, and then we had to bat-

tle back from a slow start to the season. If we don't have that tenacity to dig ourselves out of the hole we put ourselves in, then we wouldn't have been able to have the success we did at the end of the season."

As for the game, the Bulldogs fell behind early and were not able to climb back into the game. The devils scored 13 in the first quarter and eight in the second quarter, and held the Bulldogs scoreless to take a 21-0

lead into halftime. The Bulldogs would finally break through on a three-yard touchdown pass from sophomore quarterback Black Burmester to senior Ryder Strother with 5:59 left in the 3rd. Burmester finished the game 14-of-27 passing for 110 yards, one touchdown and one interception. The Green Devils scored their last touchdown of the game late in the third quarter to take a 27-7 lead. That was the score in which the game would end, after neither

team scored in the fourth quarter. Senior Jacob Mahler was the Bulldogs' leading rusher with 44 rushing yards on eight carries. Senior Brody Strother was the Bulldogs' leading receiver with five catches for 57 yards. Senior Brady Harr collected the Bulldogs' lone interception of the game.

The loss dropped the Bulldogs' record to 5-5 on the season, and they finished 3-2 in district play. The Bulldogs had 15 seniors that

played their last game in the football program, and those seniors hugged all of the coaches at the conclusion of the game. Coach Miller spoke on the impact those seniors had on the program.

"I always knew they were a passionate group about football," he said. "They have put in so much time. Most of them have been playing since they were fifth graders. I'm gonna miss those guys greatly, and I appreciate them fighting until the very end."

Basement Bunch Welcomes New Coaches

The Hampton-Dumont-CAL (HDCAL) Basement Bunch will have two new coaches for the upcoming season. Daniel Stevens and his son, Jaymes Stevens, were introduced as the new coaches in October. Daniel is a former assistant coach for the HDCAL varsity wrestling team, and Jaymes graduated from HDCAL in 2025 and was a four year letter man for the Bulldogs' wrestling team. Coach Daniel Stevens discussed what the basement bunch is and why he chose to be a coach for the program.

"It is our youth wrestling program here in Hampton," he said. "Jaymes wrestled in it. A lot of kids that have gone through Hampton have wrestled in the basement bunch. Jaymes and I saw there was an opening and just decided to take that opportunity to

coach together."

The Basement Bunch has been around since the early 90's and has given kids from Hampton the ability to learn about the sport of wrestling at a very young age. There are two different age groups, kindergarten through second grade and third grade through sixth grade, that meet for practices twice a week. Jaymes has always loved wrestling and said he wants to pass his knowledge of the sport on to the next generation.

"I want everyone to try wrestling because anyone can succeed at it," he said. "You don't need to be this giant super strong build. I was never the biggest or strongest kid, and that's why I think wrestling is so great for everybody."

Jaymes discussed what the goal is when coaching the kindergarten through second graders.

"We try to make it fun for them," he said. "Keep them interested in it. To get them to keep staying out and keep doing it to build that culture, while we teach

them the fundamentals of the sport."

Daniel discussed the more detailed coaching sessions with the third through sixth graders.

"With the older group, we are focusing more on the skills of wrestling with learning more advanced moves," he said. "They really get into more of the wrestling side of it. Teaching them some technique and some fun stuff like that."

Daniel said that many of the wrestlers from the high school team will help coach in some of the sessions, and that really helps create a community for the kids to be a part of. The members of the basement bunch will also get to compete in multiple tournaments, with some of the tournaments being more for fun and some of the tournaments being more competitive. Jaymes talked about how thrilled he is to be able to coach a long side his dad.

"I just think it is cool that since I was four he has been coaching me my whole wrestling career and

then as soon as I'm done I turn around and now we are coaching together," he said. "I just think it's a great thing and a great moment for us."

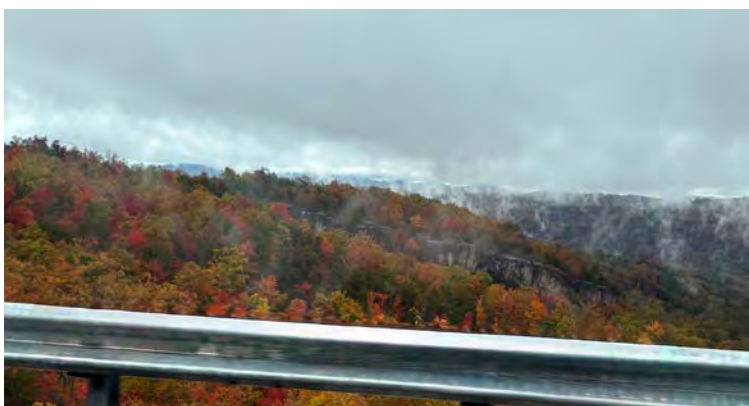

The program helps take the guesswork out of whether a change would increase profitability and improve cash flow. Using FINPACK software, associates can generate an in-depth evaluation of the farm business, which many lenders require before extending further credit.



According to Ann Johannes, program specialist for Ag Decision Maker with ISU Extension and Outreach, the current outlook continues to show tight margins for producers. "Finding ways to stretch cash flow is another important consideration, along with working closely with your finance and tax professional," she said. The Ag Decision Maker file "Farm Financial Management: 16 Ways to Stretch Cash Flow" is another valuable resource that provides tips and resources to help producers manage margins.

The Farm Financial

Program team comprises seven associates. Leslie Miller, who joined the team in 2021 after retiring from a career in the agricultural lending industry that dates back to the 1980s, draws on her experience to help farmers analyze their situation and pursue their goals.

"I enjoy helping farmers reach their goals so they can have a successful farming operation," she said. "I like working with them to solve their problems and find answers to their questions."

es. They offer a big-picture look at the farm, while farmers make the final decisions and follow up with recommended specialists.

Miller said farm profitability is an ongoing concern, as input prices continue to rise and crop prices hover below the breakeven point. She helps producers fine-tune their cash flow projections by examining different options for the future.

"We run multiple alternatives and compare them side-by-side," she said. "A borrower can look at those numbers and see what the impact of different decisions might be. Our goal is to consider the 'what ifs' for each decision."

AMES – Urban growers interested in indoor farming are invited to attend an upcoming webinar hosted by the Iowa State University Extension and Outreach Urban Agriculture Program. The webinar will take place on Thursday, Dec. 11, from 1 to 2 p.m. (CT). Christopher Currey, associate professor of horticulture at ISU, will present a session titled "Controlled Environments for Urban Ag: A Primer."

Currey's research focuses on developing science-based best management practices to help commercial greenhouse and controlled-environment producers improve productivity, profitability and sustainability.

According to Graham Sandersfeld, urban agriculture outreach specialist with ISU Extension and Outreach, the webinar will introduce key concepts and decisions in hydroponics and other controlled-environment systems. "These innovative practices allow year-round food production when outdoor growing isn't possible," he said. Participants will gain insight into the benefits and considerations of small-scale indoor food production in urban settings.

Following the presentation, webinar attendees are encouraged to share their questions about indoor farming in a Q&A session with Currey. A computer with a keyboard is recommended for participation.

Six Iowa Communities Receive State Grants to Plan for Future Housing Needs

AMES -- Six Iowa communities -- Forest City, Imogene, Lake Mills, Manchester, West Burlington and the Clarion Development Alliance -- have each received a \$20,000 Empower Rural Iowa grant to assess local housing needs in partnership with Iowa State University Extension and Outreach.

The grants, awarded by the Iowa Economic Development Authority, will help local leaders use the Rural Housing Readiness Assessment program to better understand housing challenges, engage residents and identify next steps for community growth.

"Strong housing options are the foundation of strong rural communities," said Omar Padilla, community development specialist with ISU Extension and Outreach. "The RHRA

process helps local leaders turn data into action and create plans that attract investment and improve quality of life."

More than 60 Iowa communities have participated in the RHRA program since its creation. Together, they've sparked over \$132 million in housing investment, with another \$104 million in progress. Implementation projects have included zoning updates, downtown housing plans and neighborhood revitalization efforts.

"These grants give communities both structure and momentum," Padilla said. "It's not just a plan on paper; it's a roadmap that helps local people move forward."

Burning of yard waste shall not occur at a proximity of less than 20 feet from any structure or building and shall be supervised by a competent person at all times and shall not be left unattended until the fire is completely extinguished.

NOTE: If the smoke generated is excessive, persons may be instructed to extinguish the burn until items are drier and likely to create less smoke. Windy conditions may also result in the need to refrain from or stop open burning. Violations will be enforced with the potential for citations and fines for non-compliance.

The Dumont City Council met on Thursday, October 9, 2025 at 7:00 p.m. at the Dumont EMS Building with Mayor Mouw presiding. In time for public comment, Councilman Shear contacted the Iowa DOT regarding placing an LED stop sign at the corner of Main Street and Highway 3. He was informed there were not enough accidents at that location to warrant a need for this type of stop sign. The cemetery cameras were also discussed. Public Works Director, Juan Montalvo has been in contact with MidAmerican Energy and A & M Electric on this project. They will let us know when they have finished the work needed to install the cameras.

Gov. Kim Reynolds orders support for food banks, pantries ahead of SNAP lapse

Gov. Kim Reynolds announced Thursday she will deploy Iowa National Guard members to assist with Iowa food banks and pantries and direct the state to match donations beginning Nov. 1 if the federal government does not reopen. Benefits through the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, known as SNAP, will not be distributed beginning in November if the federal government shutdown, which on Thursday reached 30 days, continues. As there does not seem to be a resolution in sight, charitable organizations are preparing to see a surge in demand in Iowa and across the country from families seeking food assistance. While Iowa has not moved to provide state backing for SNAP benefits as some other states have considered, Reynolds announced the state will provide “interim support” for Iowa food banks and pantries if SNAP benefits end as expected. These supports include plans to deploy Iowa National Guard members for active duty, conducting food distribution missions throughout the state, as well as planned meetings with the Iowa Department of Health and Human Services and Volunteer Iowa to recruit and deploy volunteers “to support food assistance operations in

communities across the state where help is needed.” Additionally, Reynolds directed Iowa HHS to use existing state funds to match cash donations to the state’s six regional food banks up to \$1 million, beginning Nov. 3, if the shutdown continues. “Government plays an important role in supporting its citizens, but we each have a personal responsibility to care for the people in our communities, especially those in need,” Reynolds said in a statement. “That’s why the state will match up to \$1 million in contributions made by Iowans for regional food banks across our state. Together, we can make an even bigger difference for our neighbors who need help during this time.” A spokesperson for the Des Moines Area Religious Council said their organization was “grateful for the office of the governor’s work to create an emergency response for Iowans in need.” “This increased collaboration and communication with Iowa HHS and agencies like DMARC is an important step to remove barriers for our neighbors as they navigate an incredibly difficult time,” Blake Willadsen, communications manager for DMARC said. “SNAP is our nation’s most effective tool for fighting hunger, and the loss of it this November will be felt especially hard by families, children, and seniors across our state.” Food banks, pantries and other organizations

said last week they expect to see “unprecedented” need across the state if SNAP benefits end, as the food assistance program serves roughly 270,000 Iowans each month. In addition to the state’s response, there have also been several private organizations pledging support for these entities in the coming week. Local businesses including Big Grove Brewery and The Big Grove for Good Foundation have announced plans to donate a total of \$12,000 to three Iowa food banks, Hy-Vee will donate \$100,000 to food banks in its regions

and Fareway and the Iowa Pork Producers Association are collaborating to donate \$20,000 worth of pork to food banks across the state. The three Medicaid managed care organizations in Iowa, Iowa Total Care, Molina Healthcare of Iowa, and Wellpoint Iowa, have also committed to donate \$100,000 to support the governor’s news release. Members of Iowa’s all Republican federal delegation have supported measures to provide funding for SNAP if the shutdown continues. U.S. Rep. Mariannette Miller-Meeks in-

troduced a bill Friday to let the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture access emergency funds to maintain SNAP operations during the shutdown. On Monday, U.S. Rep. Zach Nunn toured the Food Bank of Iowa and called for Democrats to support the continuing resolution passed in the House — a short-term funding bill that does not include Democrats’ language on extending Affordable Care Act tax credits — in order to prevent SNAP benefits from being halted. “This shutdown is threatening food on the table for hundreds of

thousands of Iowa families—many of them kids, new moms, and seniors,” Nunn said in a statement. “We cannot expect Iowa food banks and families to pay for Washington’s dysfunction. I’m calling on Senate Democrats to set partisanship aside and pass our clean continuing resolution before we reach the funding cliff.” *Read more from Robin Opsahl online at IowaCapitalDispatch.com ©Copyright 2025, Iowa Capital Dispatch. 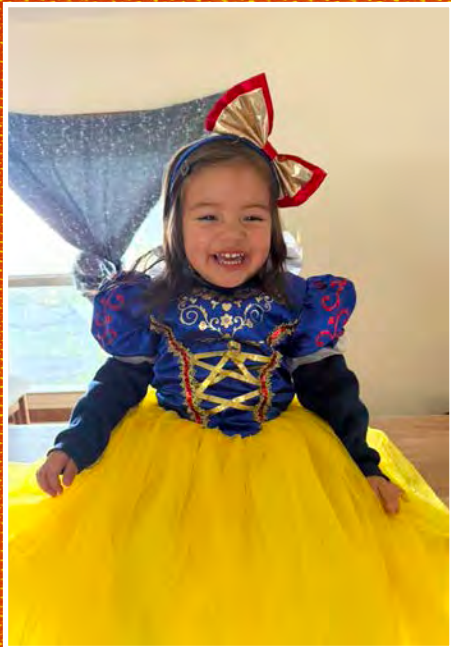
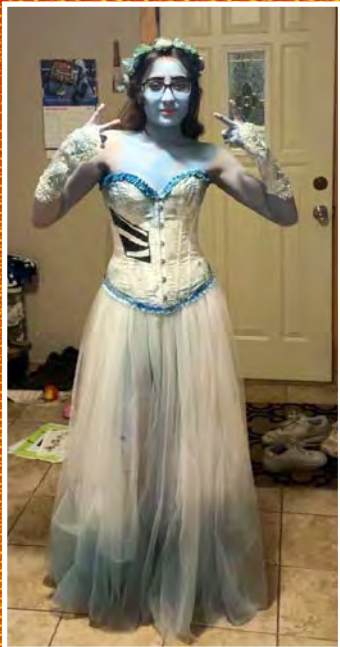
